I am pleased to offer my second letter to you, the community members that comprise Windham Southwest Supervisory Union. It is a privilege to continue to serve as your Superintendent. Over the past year and eight months, I have been able to get to know the many wonderful people that work across our supervisory union. Wow, we have such a capable and caring team of people! I am particularly impressed by our faculty and staff's dedication and passion. Furthermore, we have board members and community partners who demonstrate a deep and long commitment to our schools. It is clear that it is our shared ethic of care and hard work that makes Windham Southwest Supervisory Union special.

While we at WSWSU are proud of our people and their accomplishments, we know that the work must continue. Windham Southwest continues to be on the path of transformation to create schools that provide learning environments where every child succeeds. We are moving steadily forward on this path with enthusiasm and a sense of urgency to reach our goals. We take the responsibility of every child's learning seriously and understand that every moment counts for our children. The direction in which we are moving is outlined in our Continuous Improvement Plan (CIP). Our CIP plan is a multi-year action plan that has three major components that together guide the work that we are doing:

- 1. Improve student learning and ensure students are proficient in, or demonstrate mastery in, the core subject areas and transferable skills (the soft skills needed to succeed in the workplace): a.k.a. Proficiency Based Learning
- 2. Make learning more personalized, meaningful and engaging: a.k.a. Personalized Learning
- 3. Ensure that we have safe and healthy schools where students have their social and emotional needs met and are ready to learn.

All WSWSU professionals are invested in this important work. The WSWSU Administrative Leadership Team facilitates this work among our educators to realize these goals. This year we have been focusing on creating a more effective Multi-tiered System of Supports (MTSS) at every school. We view our MTSS as a vehicle to reach our goal of improving student learning, and ensuring students are proficient in the core subject areas, social emotional skills, and transferable skills. We have identified that an effective MTSS includes the following components:

- High quality instruction and intervention in academics and social emotional learning
- Comprehensive assessment
- Expertise
- Effective collaboration
- Constant decision making for excellence and equity
- A culture of continuous improvement

Across WSWSU we are engaged in professional development to support our work around MTSS and our CIP. We aim to foster environments where students are ready to learn and can master what they need to learn. We are committed to offering the best education for our students and we will not stop working towards every child reaching their full potential.

Lastly, and most importantly, I want to express my appreciation to the residents and taxpayers for your continued support of the students in our districts. We can not do the important work that we do without you. Thank you.

### Twin Valley Schools Annual Principal Report 2019/2020

### **Financial Statement:**

The Twin Valley administration has not made any budget increases outside of personnel contracts and special education since consolidation, six years ago. We feel this budget is fiscally responsible while also supporting the learning needs of our students.

### **Celebrations/Accomplishments:**

**Proficiency Based Learning -** We are a PreK-12 system that has made the transition to Proficiency Based graduation requirements per state law. Our report cards and transcripts reflect this shift. Proficiency Based Learning is based on a set of expectations of what students will know and will be able to do at the time of graduation. These expectations were developed by the Vermont Agency of Education and have been adopted as written by the TVUUSD. PBL as it is known by its acronym is about mastery through repeated practice and assessment.

TVES- This year we implemented a content specialist model where teachers teach one subject area to a cohort of students.

TVMHS- This year the middle high school updated its Proficiency Based Learning procedures, including graduation requirements, in an effort to communicate our practices more clearly to all stakeholders. We also rolled out new, streamlined versions of our report cards and transcripts.

**Culture/Climate-** Twin Valley Schools are proud of our healthy culture, where relationships are highly valued.

TVES-Community building events such as Trunk or Treat, math night, author's night, concerts, field day, student led conferences, and family picnic nurture the connections we have to our families. Whole school celebration happens each week where we celebrate learning and expected behaviors as a school community. This year we are working with HCRS, our local mental health agency, to support the social emotional needs of our students.

TVMHS- Community building events including our holiday luncheon, welcome barbeque for new students, and student-led Personalized Learning Plan presentations have all enhanced our sense of community and connections with families. Senior Awards Night, National Honor Society Induction ceremony, Science Fair, and Wildcat Innovators Learning Dynamically (WILD) night all celebrate the strengths and achievements of our students.

### The budget is supporting each TV student to have the opportunity to ...

**Multi-Tiered System of Supports-** Each student is supported by a system of supports that meets their unique learning needs.

TVES- The school's support team supports the social emotional and behavioral needs of students while paraeducators, special educators and Math and Literacy coaches support the academic needs of students alongside strong classroom instruction from our highly qualified teaching staff. High expectations, strong assessment and curriculum, and goal setting lead to our students' growth.

TVMHS- This year we have been working towards clarifying, organizing, and strengthening our tiers of support for academic, social emotional, and behavioral needs. Regular data-driven meetings of departments and grade levels have helped our teaching staff identify areas of need. We have also strengthened our assessment plan with the introduction of the FASTBridge platform for benchmarking and progress monitoring.

**Innovation-** The TV mission is to "grow innovators who will change the world."

We are preparing students for jobs / careers that have yet to be invented. What employers are asking for are students who have what we used to call "soft skills" which are now known as the "Transferrable Skills" - being able to communicate effectively; self direction or being able to work independently; being able to creatively and practically solve problems; use informed and integrative thinking; and be responsive and involved citizens.

TVES- We nurture the 21st century learning values such as creative problem solving, perseverance, making mistakes, being flexible, and collaborating. Innovation happens through genius hour, the arts, after school programming, technology instruction such as coding, artist in residence, winter sports, outdoor learning programming, Four Winds, to name a few.

TVMHS- Clear and effective communication, self direction, creative and practical problem solving, responsible and involved citizenship, and informed and integrative thinking are the 21st century skills needed for our students to be successful. Students have opportunities to be innovative in applying these skills through opportunities such as WILD, the arts, Wings and Fresh after school programs, winter activities, project-based learning, and electives, among others.

**PLP-** Personalized learning plans are developed Pre K-12th grade in our schools. This was a direct result of state legislation.

TVES- PLP's focus on community goals in the early grades and transition to including academic goals in grades 1-3. Our 4th & 5th grade students create their own technology based PLP's that reflect academic goals as well as areas of personal interest.

TVMHS- As students continue to build their PLP's and learn more about themselves and their passions they build a roadmap to meet their future goals. Their plan for becoming the best they can be and securing the future they desire through their education is constantly monitored, assessed and modified as needed.

### SUMMARY OF BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS 2020-2021

- The TVUUSD budget amount for 2020-2021 is \$9,432,346 which is a combination of Elementary \$3,756,604 and Middle/High School \$5,063,708, plus \$488,733 needed for repayment of the Bond for Construction totaling \$9,309,045. The Federal Schoolwide budget for Twin Valley Elementary and Twin Valley Middle High School is \$123,301 which brings the total budget amount to be voted on to \$9,432,346. Federal Schoolwide budget of \$123,301 is funded through federal monies.
- This budget number represents a .95% increase in the Elementary School overall costs over last year and a decrease of 2.56% at the Middle–High level.
- Both Teachers Union and Para Union Contracts are currently in negotiations for FY'21 with the approved statewide health insurance benefit package to be implemented mid-year in January 2021.
- Health insurance cost increases are estimated at this point based on information provided, however, exact rate increases have not yet been accepted by the regulatory commission. Districts may see increased costs for health insurance above the projected premium costs, due to the approved statewide health insurance bargaining that will give access to more staff, but also will reduce board costs in some instances for less than 1.0 FTE teachers who may have received a larger benefit prior.
- WSWSU budget assessments for both regular education and special education have decreased for the TVUUSD Schools for FY'21. WSWSU assessment decreased overall by \$126,609 total for all districts from 2019-2020 due to a projected decrease in special education services required to meet the needs of our students.
- Building maintenance costs (not including salaries and benefits) as a whole, are not increasing for FY'21. TVMHS is installing two new propane boilers to replace failed systems currently in the school and have budgeted for financing this system. This change is expected to save money for the District.
- Transportation costs are budgeted at WSWSU. The costs in the FY'21 budget are the net costs of services after the State Transportation Grant revenues are received by the WSWSU. Costs for the TVUUSD are projected to decrease in the FY '21 budget as our newer buses are more cost effective and have allowed for some savings to be had. We will continue to replace older buses with newer ones as needed to eliminate costly repairs to aging buses and to keep an operational fleet at all times.
- The Twin Valley Unified Union School District continues to consider the educational needs of local students as well as possible tuition students when preparing its budget. What is needed to provide the best education for the students and maintain fiscal responsibility to the taxpayers are the primary factors in making these decisions.

Almira Aekus, Treasurer for Whitingham suggested contacting the school districts auditors to check on the legality of it. The motion was called and carried by voice vote.

#### **ARTICLE VIII**

A motion was made by Theresa Lounsbury, seconded by Kathy Larsen to authorize the school Directors to deposit into a reserve fund, anticipated surplus funds at June 30, 2019, for the purpose of maintaining the

facilities and/or emergency repairs, pursuant to 24 VSA Section 2804. Discussion: Kathy Larsen stated that after June 30th the board would make a decision as to the amount but they needed the voter's approval to be able to proceed with setting up the reserve fund. Richard Lemaire questioned what amount would be transferred. Sharon Berry stated they did not know the amount. Richard Lemaire stated the article was like signing a blank check and suggested allotting a certain amount of money for the fund each year. Wilmington treasurer Kristine Richter and Whitingham treasurer Almira Aekus both spoke about the way fund balances are appropriated in their town's municipal budgets. Both towns appropriate their fund balances to the following fiscal year for example the 2018 fund balance would be appropriated to the 2020 fiscal year. John Doty pointed out that by appropriating the money from the current year fund balance the school district would avoid having to pay additional money in to the penalty box to raise the money. Motion called and carried by voice vote.

#### ARTICLE IX

To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting. Kathy Larsen thanked Treasurer Christine Richter, Clerk Almira Aekus and Moderator Leon Corse for their services as well as special thanks to Leon Corse for serving as Moderator for the school district and acknowledged that he was not running for the office this year. A motion was made by Sharon Berry, seconded by Therese Lounsbury to adjourn. All were in favor.
