

As Superintendent, I can honestly say without hesitation that as a Supervisory Union we have some of the strongest most dedicated faculty, staff, board members, parents and administrators that I have ever worked with in my 23 years of education. As a Supervisory Union we continue to move in the direction of transforming all of our schools into the 21st century learning environments. Academic success for each student is the main goal of every staff member and administrator in WSWSU. Principal's Annual Report Twin Valley Middle High School

It is an honor to submit my third annual report as Principal of Twin Valley Middle High School. Ms. Lee Ann Monroe the Assistant Principal and I have greatly appreciated the continued support, encouragement and advice we have received from community members, students, and staff.

It is amazing how quickly time goes by and now, two and a half years into this journey, we feel we are on solid footing and we are making great strides towards making TVMHS the school that both communities envisioned when they began the consolidation process.

One of the biggest changes you will see in our school has been the shift to Proficiency Based Graduation Requirements. The state of Vermont has set a new vision for education. PBL or Proficiency Based Learning is now the standard for students beginning with this year's 9th graders, the class of 2020. Our students no longer accrue credits by sitting in a seat. They are judged by an agreed upon set of standards demonstrating through a variety of methods how those standards have been met. These standards can be met through class work, independent projects, and internships extending learning long past the regular school day. The TVMHS staff is at the forefront of this initiative. When discussing what we have accomplished with other high school principals their reaction has been, "You are much farther along than we are, we have barely started".

This year we have continued to work on the concept / theme of "Communivation". We feel it is important for our students to both be able to communicate and problem solve (innovate) for us to fulfill our stated mission and vision and to prepare our students for the next phase of their lives. To that end we are in our second year of implementation of the Collins Writing Program founded by Dr. John Collins, a nationally acclaimed leader in the field of improving student thinking and writing. Dr. Collins is working in our schools with our teachers and our students to raise the bar for our students in terms of their ability to communicate.

We continue to add to our program in spite of all the challenges facing public education in Vermont. We have added dual enrollment classes (classes that our students receive both high school and college credit for) in the core areas of science, mathematics and English. We have also added classes in our arts area as well as our industrial arts program for our students who are kinesthetic learners.

We still have much work to do to realize our goal of becoming the school that was envisioned at the beginning of the consolidation process. We have begun our self study (a two year process) that will lead to our NEASC reaccreditation. We are in year one of fully implementing Act 77, flexible pathways toward graduation a major piece of proficiency based grading and proficiency based graduation requirements (a four year process).

We are thankful for your support. We are even more thankful for the opportunity we are given to work with such great kids on a daily basis. Your students, some of whom overcome tremendous obstacles just to come to school, give us their best efforts day in and day out. We cannot ask for more.



Summary of Budget Highlights 2017-2018

- The Twin Valley budget amount for 2017-2018 is \$8,614,841 which is combination of Elementary \$3,614,090 and Middle / High School \$5,000,751, an additional \$86,652 for Tax Anticipation Loan interest and Tech Center Payment costs plus \$511,980 needed for repayment of the Bond for Construction all total \$9,213,473. The Federal School-wide budget for Twin Valley Elementary and Twin Valley Middle High School is \$232,050 which brings the total budget vote amount to \$9,445,523. Federal School-wide budget of \$232,050 is funded through federal monies.
- This budget number represents a 4.5% increase in the Elementary School overall costs over last year and a reduction of 9.5% at the Middle High level with some costs estimated due to ongoing union negotiations affecting both Teacher's and Para Professional's salaries and benefits for FY'18.
- Health insurance premiums are budgeted at current contribution rates for next year, with more uncertainty than in prior years due to changes in Healthcare offerings from the Vermont Education Health Initiative (VEHI) affective Jan 1, 2018.
- Supervisory Union budget assessment, regular education and special education, has increased slightly for the Twin Valley Schools for FY'18.
 WSSU assessment decreased overall \$ 13,885 total for all districts from 2016-2017 partially due to full implementation of Act 156, which moves all special education and transportation costs and revenues to the Supervisory Union, therefore the districts are assessed the net costs only of these services.
- Building maintenance budgets (not including salaries and benefits) have increased at both schools, mainly in the areas of utilities. Maintenance costs for the vacated Twin Valley High School building are still being budgeted for another year in the Twin Valley District, while repurposing and changing of ownership of the building talks continue.
- Elementary, Middle and High School special education costs have moved to the Supervisory Union, and are realized in the Twin Valley Budget as the assessments. Costs associated with specific extras for special education students, are continued to be assessed back to the home town of the student.
- Transportation costs are also budgeted at the Supervisory Union, with the costs in the FY '18 budget being only the net costs of services after the revenues are received, by the SU. We will continue to replace older buses with newer ones as needed to eliminate costly repairs as the buses age, in order to keep an operational fleet at all times.
