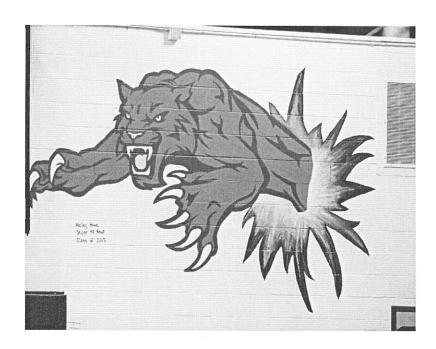

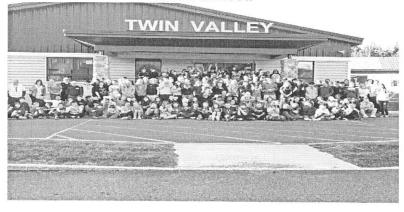

Principal's Annual Report Twin Valley Middle High School

It is an honor to submit my fourth annual report as Principal of Twin Valley Middle High School. Ms. LeeAnn Monroe the Assistant Principal and I have greatly appreciated the continued support, encouragement and advice we have received from community members, students, and staff. We are indebted to the taxpayers in Wilmington and Whitingham who continue to support our schools even as they face increasing financial hardship for their commitment to educating our students.

It is amazing how quickly time goes by and now, three and a half years into this journey, we have reached a turning point of sorts. Our students are truly Twin Valley students, they have only known our school as it is configured and have no ties, for better or worse, to the old building in Wilmington. As we build our new community with new traditions and new memories we are making great strides towards making TVMHS the school that both communities envisioned when they began the consolidation process.

One of the biggest changes you will see in our school has been the shift to Proficiency Based Graduation Requirements. Again, we thank everyone for their patience as we are literally building this program from the ground up. The state of Vermont has set a new vision for education. PBL or Proficiency Based Learning is now the standard for students in grades nine and ten. Our students no longer accrue credits by sitting in a seat. They are judged by an agreed upon set of standards demonstrating through a variety of methods how those standards have been met. These standards can be met through classwork, independent projects, and internships extending learning long past the regular school day. The TVMHS staff has been at the forefront of this initiative. While we are still working out some of the kinks, we feel that our program could be the model for the state of Vermont on how to implement PBL with fidelity.

This year we have been working on building a stronger school community. With the addition of our "House" system (we have groups that have both teachers and students from all grades) students and staff alike develop relationships across all grade levels. Whether through choosing a name for their house, picking a mascot, and creating a flag, our students have the opportunity to collaborate with a different group of people. This is all in the name of learning how to collaborate.

We still believe that it is important for our students to both be able to communicate and problem solve if we are to fulfill our stated mission and vision and to prepare our students for the next phase of their lives. To that end we are in our third year of implementation of the Collins Writing Program founded by Dr. John Collins a nationally acclaimed leader in the field of improving student thinking and writing. Dr. Collins is working in our schools with our teachers and our students to raise the bar for our students in terms of their ability to communicate.

We continue to add to our program in spite of all the challenges facing public education in Vermont. We have added dual enrollment classes (classes that our students receive both high school and college credit for) in the core areas of science, mathematics and English. We have also added classes in our arts area as well as our industrial arts program for our students who are kinesthetic learners.

We still have much work to do to realize our goal of becoming the school that was envisioned at the beginning of the consolidation process. We are in year three of fully implementing Act 77, Flexible Pathways toward Graduation, a major piece of proficiency-based grading and proficiency-based graduation requirements (a four-year process).

We are thankful for your support. We are even more thankful for the opportunity we are given to work with such great kids on a daily basis. Your students, some of whom overcome tremendous obstacles just to come to school, give us their best efforts day in and day out. We cannot ask for more.

SCHOOL WARNING TWIN VALLEY UNIFIED UNION SCHOOL DISTRICT

The legal voters of the Twin Valley Unified Union School District are hereby notified and warned to meet at the Twin Valley Elementary School Gymnasium in said Town of Wilmington, Vermont on Tuesday, February 27, 2018 at 7:00 p.m. to act on Articles VI, VII and VIII of the School District Warning.

The meeting will then be adjourned until Tuesday March 6, 2018 for voting on the remaining Articles by Australian ballot. For this purpose, the polls will open for voting at the following times:

- Wilmington, at the Twin Valley Elementary School, 7:00 a.m. (at which time the polls open) and 7:00 p.m. (at which time the polls close)
 - Whitingham, at the Twin Valley Middle High School, 10:00 a.m. (at which time the polls open) and 7:00 p.m. (at which time the polls close)

ARTICLE I

To elect a Moderator, by Australian Ballot

ARTICLE II

To elect a Clerk, by Australian Ballot

ARTICLE III

To elect a Treasurer, by Australian Ballot

ARTICLE IV

To elect (1) School Directors for two (2) year term, (1) School Director for a three (3) year term, and (1) School Director for the remaining (1) one year of a (2) two year term, by Australian Ballot

ARTICLE V

To see if the voters of the School District approve the School Board to expend \$9,219,949, which is the amount the School Board has determined to be necessary for the ensuing fiscal year. It is estimated that this proposed budget, if approved, will result in education spending of \$19,889 per equalized pupil. This is the first budget of the Unified Union District, therefore no prior year education spending per equalized pupil comparison can be made. To be voted by Australian Ballot.

ARTICLE VI

To hear the report of the Twin Valley Unified Union School District Officers and act thereon.

ARTICLE VII

To see if the Unified Union School District will vote to authorize the School Directors to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE VIII

To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Summary of Budget Highlights 2018-2019

- The Twin Valley budget amount for 2018-2019 is \$8,591,522 which is combination of Elementary \$3,568,885 and Middle / High School \$5,022,637, plus \$505,126 needed for repayment of the Bond for Construction totaling \$9,096,637. The Federal School-wide budget for Twin Valley Elementary and Twin Valley Middle High School is \$123,301 which brings the total budget amount to be voted on to \$9,219,949. Federal School-wide budget of \$123,300 is funded through federal monies.
- This budget number represents a .3% decrease in the Elementary School overall costs over last year and an increase of 1.1
- % at the Middle High level with some costs estimated due to ongoing union negotiations affecting Para Professional's salaries and benefits for FY'19.
- Health insurance premiums are less overall than previous plans offered through the Vermont Education Health Initiative (VEHI). However, negotiated Health Reimbursement Account (HRA) Board contributions in addition to Health Care Premiums, will eliminate savings for contributions for employee health care.
- Supervisory Union budget assessments for both regular education and special education, have increased for the Twin Valley Schools for FY'19. WSSU assessment increased overall by \$ 23,696 total for all districts from 2017-2018 partially due to audit costs for all districts are now in the SU budget and part of the assessment
- Building maintenance costs (not including salaries and benefits) have decreased slightly at the Elementary but increased at the High School. The Twin Valley High School is faced with much needed maintenance and replacement of the old oil boilers, which are used mainly as back-up heat and summer hot water.
- Transportation costs are also budgeted at the Supervisory Union, with the costs in the FY '19 budget being only the net costs of services after the revenues are received, by the SU. We will continue to replace older buses with newer ones as needed to eliminate costly repairs as the buses age, in order to keep an operational fleet at all times.
- Special Education Assessment Costs have decreased for the Twin Valley Elementary and Middle High. This decrease can be attributed to more expected revenues from the State to cover costs of student services and also a small fund balance in the SU Special Ed budget.

The selectboard was hoping to work with the school board to get something done in regards to the state and the funding of education.

Dwight Williams asked for clarification in the event the school budget was defeated that the budget

would go back to the prior year's budget. School Director Seth Boyd stated the law had changed and in that event the budget would be voted on repeatedly until June 30^{th} or it passed whichever came first. If a budget was not passed at that point the school directors could borrow up to eighty-seven percent of the previous year's budget which would be a \$500,000 reduction from the current budget.

Dana Dix questioned if the next budget vote would be by Australian ballot. Mr. Boyd stated it would be and that there would be informational meetings.

Seth Boyd reminded the electorate there would be an Act 46 informational meeting on Wednesday, March 8^{th} at 6:30 p.m. at the Deerfield Valley Elementary School in Wilmington. He encourages the electorate to attend.

Aimee Reed stated, for clarification what it would mean if the town continued to vote down the budget. She said that when a budget is not passed it creates un-certainty for the staff, faculty and administration. In addition, the administration had worked very hard for the last 8 years to hire good staff and create stability which enabled the students to do very well. She does not want to good teachers to leave as the longer it takes to pass a budget there may be teachers looking for jobs and it would have a negative effect on the students.

A motion was made and seconded from the floor to adjourn. Motion carried by voice vote.
